To me LUGO represents a great learning school for understanding how to have a positive impact within a large organisation, all the while having the support of fun colleagues. One project that I learnt a lot from was the Climate Call, where we gathered signatures to convince the Executive Board that sustainability should be at the core of the University's principles, and essentially that students should have a voice in what the sustainable university of the future should look like. It's not enough to have recycling
