The programme

The Middle East Studies programme at NVIC targets second and third year bachelor students of the humanities, social sciences or related fields. The interdisciplinary programme aims to familiarize students with various topics on the region with a particular focus on Egypt. The programme is made up of 5 modules, three of which explore political, economic, and cultural issues taught in English, and two Arabic language classes at various levels.

Please note: MA students may apply to this programme, but will need permission from their university first. Modules will be tailored to suit requirements of MA level study.

Module Summaries:

Contextualising Contemporary Egypt: 5 ECTS

This course will shed light on the various narratives that have appeared since the revolution in 2011, and will frame these within their historical, colonial and postcolonial contexts. The course will help students historicize current developments. Theoretically, the course tackles questions of representation and the transformation of identity politics to subjectivities, nationalities, and the politics of popular culture. Nationalism and National Identity are the main themes.

Development and Egypt: 5 ECTS

This course focuses on the interplay between current postcolonial development politics and their histories. We use the work of Timothy Mitchell as a starting off point to explore various questions of political economy. The module will examine contemporary examples and case studies that can help us better understand the politics of development in Egypt.

Gender in Egypt: 5 ECTS

This course explores gender issues in Egypt while taking into account the intersectionality of class, gender, ethnicity and race. Against the backdrop of colonialism (including the West's Orientalizing depiction of local men and women), the state, cultural constructions of gender, and Islamism, the course will look into (Islamic and non-Islamic) women's movements, masculinities, and feminist



activism. In order to do so, the course material will consist not only of theoretical texts, but will also look into cultural productions, like films, literature, music (mahraganat pop), and art. Key concepts from the social sciences, especially critical gender studies, will be introduced to serve as theoretical underpinnings.

Egyptian Colloquial Arabic (three entry levels): 10 ECTS

The focus in this module is to develop the students spoken Arabic. Egyptian colloquial Arabic is the most widely understood dialect in the Middle East. Students will be placed in classes depending on their individual levels.

Modern Standard Arabic (three entry levels): 5 ECTS

The focus in this module is to develop reading and writing skills. There will be a focus on media Arabic. Students will be placed in classes depending on their individual levels.

Language Level

Students will be placed in classes depending on their level of Arabic. Levels start from beginners.

Admission

Admission to the programme is subject to the following conditions :

- The student has successfully completed at least three semesters of in a relevant programme;
- The student has the written permission (on the registration form) of a lecturer at the home university to join the programme;
- The student is registered at one of the affiliated universities during her/his stay in Cairo

If maximum capacity is reached, an admission test will be organized.
