Abstract: I use the rigidity of the constitution as instrumental variable to find the effect of a constitutional right to social security on different expenditure schemes. I use a pooled cross sectional database for 17 EU-countries from 1990-2012 and employ OLS models, 2SLS regression models and the Heckman two-step model.

I use OLS and 2SLS regression models in which I deal with endogeneity problems extensively.
