# IOLR - 20<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Conference

Over the past two decades, IOLR has published articles on almost all aspects of the law of international organizations, written not only by academics but also by practitioners. Many contributions addressed institutional issues, ranging from legal personality to decision-making and from functionalism to constitutionalism. A number of special issues have been published, related to themes such as UN reform (2005), global administrative law (2009), responsibility of international organizations (2012), immunity of international organizations (2014) and COVID-19 and international organizations (2021). At the occasion of its 20th anniversary, the journal aims to take stock of why we actually study international organizations as a separate field of international law. At the Vienna Conference, members of the Editorial Board will share their 'love for international organizations', to use the title of an article recently published in IOLR by our board member Jean d'Aspremont. As argued by d'Aspremont, "international organizations continue to occupy a very central place in the practical, conceptual, cognitive, imaginary, and emotional universe of international lawyers. [...] the resilient centrality of international organizations in international legal thought and practice is the manifestation of international lawyers' love for such institutions." His contribution maps a number of "drivers that inform international lawyers' love for international organizations with a view to elucidating what lies behind the centrality of international organizations in international legal thought and practice."

Indeed, what we aim to find out after 20 successful years of IOLR is what we actually like about studying international organizations. What are the specific characteristics of this field of study that continue to provide a source of inspiration for both academics and practitioners?
